FROM PASTOR LINDA

The Passion of Christ

Many churches are rushing to get people to **Mel Gibson's** movie, "The Passion of Christ." **Ebert** and **Roeper** have given this clearly Christian movie two "thumbs up".

Many are hoping this film will communicate the Christian faith and the truth of Christ in a way that will stir a great revival in our nation and beyond. **Mel Gibson's** own home country of Australia has been infamous for its rejection of Christianity.

How will we be ready to be a part of reaching unchurched folks with the "Good News" that **Jesus**' sacrifice and suffering was for the benefit of all? **God's** grace is active in every person's life, but it is often asleep, inactive, or replaced with a "passion" for something else. **Mel Gibson**, in an interview with **Diane Sawyer**, spoke about how he had everything anyone could want – fame, wealth, possessions – but none of that satisfied. He was empty inside until he returned to his faith. This movie was a labor of love for him. A telling of the story of **Christ** from his point of view.

Many of God's children fail to respond to God's grace until something awakens within. In the Gospel of **John** we see many examples of people who come to recognize **Jesus'** true identity in stages. People begin in the dark; they are clueless to the meaning of **Jesus** in their lives. But, if they will only respond to **God's** grace, a whole new life is open to them.

The Church is becoming increasingly aware of the lost souls surrounding her. Ignite '03 was an event that helped to awaken us to the needs that surround us. How can we as believers help those "in the dark" enter the light of **God's** truth? Here at EUMC, we followed the Ignite '03 event with training on how to be a *Contagious Christian*. Some of our members have been praying about and pondering about the best way to reach out into our community with the love and truth of **Christ**. **Pam Lambert**, **Julie Griffo**, and **Jon Shively** have formed a team for the purpose of reaching those who are not sure they know **Jesus**. On Sunday evening at 5 PM they will offer a time for seekers to encounter **Christ** through praise, prayer, conversation, and experience. The team wants this to be an informal time, so we will meet in the Education Building, and will have snacks and fellowship following the meeting. The teams desire is for this to be a time for seekers to find the answers to the hearts deepest questions and unnamed

desires. Some of the things that will be a part of the evening are contemporary and traditional camp/praise music (with some Country and Hispanic flavor mixed in), informal times of prayer, skits, testimonies, question and answer opportunities, and spiritual formation exercises. The time will conclude with light snacks.

Here is where you come in. This time will only be effective if you invite your friends, relatives, acquaintances, and neighbors. The team is planning a non-threatening environment for those who are not now attending a church (but will be enjoyable for those who are active in the church as well). The team is planning for a variety of music styles and a broad range of faith experiences. Perhaps you have never considered how difficult it is to enter a strange environment where dread, panic, and alarm are the main emotions experienced by people who have had a "bad experience" in the church, or who have never been to a worship service. This Sunday evening seeker event will allow people to become familiar with the church and it's members in a less threatening setting. Plan to join the seeker team on Sunday evening at 5 PM and bring a friend, relative, acquaintance, or neighbor. Those of you who have taken part in the Contagious Christian, this is an opportunity for you to "practice" all you learned and provides you a place to bring your friends.

Pastor's Reflections

Here we are at the beginning of Lent once again. Some people do not like the season of Lent because they are asked to give up something (sacrifice). This year the finance committee has asked that we save a quarter a day for the Lenten season. I think the new movie coming out on Ash Wednesday can do much to help a traditional ritual become filled with new life. From everything I have heard "The Passion of Christ" will break you out of the doldrums and get you into the proper frame of mind for Easter. I hope many of you will have the opportunity to see this film before Easter. Perhaps we can go as a group and have "p izza" and debrief afterwards. If you are interested please let me know.

But let's turn back to the subject of Lent. I am so excited that so many of you will be participating in studying *The Purpose Driven Life*. Lent is traditionally a time of self-reflection. I have read the book through once and look forward to studying it with you during the next 40 days. This book is a natural for the spiritual practice of *journaling*. If you have never used the spiritual practice of *journaling*, I think you would find it a very useful tool in your journey of salvation. If you are unsure of how to journal, I will be glad to talk to you about the advantages and styles of *journaling*.

How exciting it will be to see how each of us will grow in spiritual maturity during the next 40 days and beyond. I will be happy to come to your group when my schedule allows. I hope the new groups you form during this season of Lent will become a special group of support for each of you. One of the six levers that Patton speaks of in his book about a small church that became big (see article on **God's** Dream Team) centers on the importance of growth groups. This is simply a revision of John Wesley's class and society meetings that were key elements of the Methodist movement in England. Did you realize that the outline for this system of support, study, and encouragement are still in *The Book of Discipline*? Perhaps it is time for us to turn back to our roots.

My hope for each of you during this time of Lent is that you will grow closer to **Jesus** and become just like him, and in the process you will also grow closer to your brothers and sisters in **Christ**.

The Price of Stewardship

Our church leaders were treated in February to a visit by **Rev. Sanford Coon** of the New Mexico United Methodist Foundation.



Rev. Coon receives support from the Conference to consult with local congregations on financial stewardship programs. There is a lot of information indicating that churches under "redink stresses" use secular fund-raising methods (collecting money), rather than Christian stewardship procedures, which address the money Christians give to God.

Led by **Rev. Coon**, the group discussed some of the facts about giving over the last year (of four denominations studied, United Methodist members each gave 1/3 to 1/4 the amounts of the others), and the features of some of the most successful stewardship methods. A key feature is taking a spiritually-focused approach, rather than a dollar-focused approach. While we will always have to have a budget and track our offerings against our expenses, there is a lot we

can do to discern God's will and emphasize the spiritual aspect in this area of our church administration.

Based on our discussion, the group agreed that we could benefit from further consultation. **Rev. Coon** will return March 12 for a follow-up presentation, and then will continue to work with several members of the Ad Council/Finance Committee to assist us in developing an effective program for the Estancia UMC. He stressed that to change how we approach our finances means that we must change. As Christians, we commit to submitting ourselves as clay to the Potter on a daily basis. Please keep the church leadership in prayer as we seek to learn new ways of responsibly managing the resources **God** so generously provides us. -Roci Galyn, Roving Reporter


college to pursue a career as a veterinarian.

MEMBER'S MEMORIES

Ethel Floyd has been a member of our church for the last 56 years. This is her story:



Ethel Floyd

I was born in Kingman County, Kansas, the oldest of five girls. I have lived most of my life on a farm/ranch. I'm still a "Country Gal". When I was 12 years old, our family was in a tornado. It destroyed our three story home. The only part above floor level was two walls that fell and formed an upside-down "V" over our heads. I'm sure that God wasn't through with us yet. I was the only one injured. Something struck me behind the ear which resulted in some facial paralysis. I had hundreds of splinters in my legs. It was a very "scary" experience.

During WWII, I took a six weeks course in riveting and worked for over a year for Boeing Aircraft Company as "Rosy, the Riveter" My husband was transferred to Estancia in 1943 as an engineer for the opening of a soil Conservation Office. He was later transferred to Springer where I lived for one year. I accepted a job with the Farm Security Office (later named Farmers Home Administration) in Alamogordo and moved there with my two sons in 1946, That office closed in 1947 and I was transferred back to Estancia. My two boys and I joined

the Estancia Methodist Church in 1948 while Rev. **Clyde Galbreath** was pastor. I was divorced and married my boss, **Richard Floyd (Slim)** in 1950. His wife had died of cancer in 1946. With my two boys and his three boys and one girl, we had a houseful and had to double the size of our house. Most of the children were in college or high school but were all home in the summertime. Thank goodness, we had a dairy to help satisfy the appetites of five grown boys and one girl.

Realizing we couldn't finance all the educational needs with just the dairy, we both went to work at Sandia Base (now Kirkland Air Force Base) as well as milking about 30 cows and selling milk. We drove back and forth for two years on the two lane I-40 (this was before it became a four lane highway). It was so stressful, that we both found work back in Estancia. Slim had taught school years before in Estancia and he went back to teaching and was principal of the school in Willard until it closed and he was transferred back to Estancia as principal of the Junior High until he retired in 1969. I went to work for the Welfare Dept., and worked there for 22 years.

Our hard work and efforts paid off. All the children have done very well and all are retired now. Their occupations varied from a College Professor; Supv. of Farmers Home Administration; MD - surgeon; Child Welfare Caseworker; Engineer for Dept of Interior and Engineer at IBM. Slim's daughter, Gretchen, passed away with cancer in 1988.

We traveled a little following our retirement. We went to England and Europe in 1977. We visited all of the children, none of which live in the same state. Slim passed away in 1986. I continue to live in the "Old Homestead".

Mother Roots Study Underway


As we gather this time of year

God's Dream Team

On Friday, January 30th the first Dream Team meeting took place with five in attendance. The hour started with a discussion about our dreams for the church. Then we began to discuss the dreams that God has for His Church. Our discussions in the future will be centered around two books on Church growth. The first book is *The Purpose Driven Church*, by Rick Warren (The Purpose Driven Life), and the other is a book by a United Methodist minister, Jeff Patton and is called, If It Could Happen Here... Turning the Small Membership Church Around. We talked about surfing spiritual waves. This surfing is learning to ride the waves that God builds. Just like surfers see a good wave and learn to make the most of it (the best waves are often in the middle of a storm), we need to watch the horizon and be ready to ride the waves that **God** sends. No matter how hard we try we can't build a wave of God's spirit in our own power. Thus, man cannot produce growth. Only God can create waves of revival, waves of growth, and waves of spiritual receptivity.

We talked about some areas where many churches get side tracked on secondary issues. Churches primarily driven by tradition are often heard to say, "We've always done it this way." The goal is to simply perpetuate the past. Traditionally motivated churches are often bound together by rules, regulations, and rituals. What would change if these churches were bound instead by a sense of purpose and mission?

Sometimes churches are bound by personality and the main question becomes, "What does the leader want?" This person may be the pastor or a layperson. A personality driven church's agenda is determined more by the background, needs, and insecurities of the leader than by God's will, or even the needs of the people.

Churches driven by finances tend to ask, "What will it cost?" Nothing else ever seems guite as important as finances. The most heated debate in a finance-driven church is over the budget. The greater issue should always be what **God** wants the church to do. The most important question is not, "How much did we save?" but "Who was served and saved?"

Buildings drive some churches. When a church is driven by the desire to have a nice building the members may spend more than they can afford. Paying for and maintaining the building becomes the biggest budget item. The actual ministry of the church suffers in the process. It becomes a case of the tail wagging the dog. On the other hand, some churches allow the smallness of their building to set and limit future growth. Staying with a historic, but inadequate, building should never take priority over reaching the community.

Events, while a necessity, can also become the driving purpose in a church. There can be a lot of activity in a church but not necessarily productivity. When a church stays busy without having a clear purpose for what it does someone needs to ask, "What is the purpose behind each of our activities?" Is attendance the sole measurement of faithfulness and maturity? Church leaders must always be wary of the tendency to allow meetings to replace ministry as the primary activity of believers.

In an honest attempt to reach unbelievers for Christ, and be relevant in today's culture, some churches allow the needs of the unbelievers to become their driving force. While we must be sensitive to the needs, hurts, and interests of seekers, we cannot allow seekers to drive the total agenda of the church. There is a difference in being seeker sensitive and seeker driven.

The goal is to be a *purpose driven* church. Those of you who have begun the study on the *purpose driven life* will soon understand what is meant by purpose driven. The way we are using purpose driven here is in the sense of fulfilling God's purpose. The Dream Team is gathering again on March 5th to seek God's purpose and to learn how to surf God's spiritual waves. Keep the team in your prayers.
