Wise-Shepherds

The interesting thing about the birth account are the *visitors*. Both "know about, decide, and travel" to visit the scene of the event.

- 1. The wise men and the shepherds come to know something of the happening by different means. The magi were "scholars", people who studied, who examined, thought about and looked about for the unusual and suggested. The shepherds were doing their job and were visited by angelic sightings and were informed about the event. That's not to say they didn't know about expectations of the Messiah
 - **2.** Both, from their base of knowledge, had to choose to travel to the site and confirm the happening. The wise men from a far distance and the shepherds a relatively short distance.
 - 3. The wise men differed because they brought gifts.
- **4.** The visitors both left changed. For what they knew, how they traveled, and what they perceived had to have an impact on their remaining lives.

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5. Who are we for what we know, what we need, what needs changing, and how we might perceive? What I learn from the scene visitors, there is no set of standards about knowing, deciding, or perceiving. It comes to each of us differently - to seek, feel, observe, and experience the Christ event.

6. So! What about you this season? Will you go about life different because of the visitation of God through the Christ Child?

Stained Glass Project

The stained glass project is progressing very well.

Ruth Moon and I have just completed a stained glass painting class and completed the face, hands, and one visible foot of Jesus in the garden window. Other major accomplishments are:

- Bill Simms has built two work tables and three project boards (all are currently in use). He is now working on a third table.
- Don Fitzner and Gary are replacing two eight-foot light fixtures that did not work as well as a light switch in the restroom. Don also provided a small refrigerator.
- Jan Cool bought a new microwave oven so we can heat water and snacks. Della provided a coffee maker and small refrigerator.
- The "Methodist Cross" window is about 50% complete. This means all the glass is cut and half of the glass and came has been assembled. The window should be ready for installation in about a week or so.

- The Nativity scene window, being worked on primarily by Jan Cool, is about 25% complete. We are trying to have this window complete by Christmas. Jan thinks this is a very ambitious schedule, but I like to set goals high for us and with God's help we can do it.
- Della has just started the "Jesus in the Garden" window.
- Phil Levy has finished stripping and staining the "Methodist Cross" and "Jesus in the Garden" window frames and is well along on the Nativity scene windows.
- The faces and hands (14 total pieces) of the Nativity scene have been sketched by Ruth Moon and I have cut all the glass so Ruth can start painting the pieces.

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• The Church Fantasy Bazaar resulted in over \$600.00 for the project. The team made a number of stained glass items that sold-out at the Bazaar.

• Pastor Spooner continues to help out in many ways from cutting out patterns, helping select glass, and assembling tools.

As you can see a lot is going on and a lot of people need to be thanked for their participation and contributions to the project.

Also be watching for a write-up in the East Mountain Telegraph in the next couple of weeks. A journalist is coming next Monday, December 9, 2008 to do a story on the project. This will give us an opportunity to tell our story that this a community project and everyone is encouraged to contribute in some way.

Those of us that work with the inner workings (paperwork etc.) are so grateful for all the special gifts of money, time and energy that all of you put forth.



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Hanging of the Greens

A Traditional Advent Worship Service

The Sanctuary Greens

The garlands which we hang in the sanctuary have long been a part of Christmas observances. Laurel and bay leaves symbolize victory and triumph; the yew and the cypress, eternal life; holly was a symbol of joy and peace; wreaths of holly represented the unending, timeless nature of such qualities. These greens remind us of the timeless nature of the Christmas message, and the eternal dimension of the Gospel. In our own day, when the relationships of nature and human technology seem so disruptive, the greens remind us of the need to rediscover the earth as God's glorious and delicate creation.

The Window Greens

Of all the Christmas symbols, none is more familiar than the evergreen. Its use during this season is common throughout the world, both as simple decoration and as the Christmas tree. Long before the birth of Christ, evergreens were used as an emblem of eternal life. Now, as a Christian symbol, the evergreen represents Jesus Christ, who is eternal life.

The Altar Greens

Poinsettias are the flowers of Christmas. They are growing things; their beauty is alive in splendid color. They call us to celebrate the world about us and share its beauty in the place where we worship. The poinsettia is a vivid plant, full of meaning. A cluster of small yellow flowers springs forth from among crimson leaves, which themselves contrast sharply with the remaining green leaves of the plant. The star-shaped formation of the red leaves suggests the guiding star of Bethlehem. The crown of yellow flowers reminds us of Him who was born the infant King. The blood-red leaves foreshadow the the cruel cross that lay ahead for the King of Glory. And underneath, the carpet of green, the reflection of abundant life.

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying


Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will towards men.

Let us go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing that has come to pass, which the Lord has made known to us.



praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told unto them.



The Missing Five Pound Note

Chippenham George worked for the Post Office and his job was to process all the mail that had illegible addresses. One day just before Christmas, a letter landed on his desk simply addressed in shaky handwriting: 'To God'. With no other clue on the envelope, George opened the letter and read:

Dear God.

I am an 93 year old widow living on the State pension. Yesterday someone stole my purse. It had £100 in it, which was all the money I had in the world and no pension due until after Christmas. Next week is Christmas and I had invited two of my friends over for Christmas lunch. Without that money, I have nothing to buy food with. I have no family to turn to, and you are my only hope. God; can you please help me?

Chippenham George was really touched, and being kind hearted, he put a copy of the letter up on the staff notice board at the main Fareham sorting office where he worked. The letter touched the other postmen and they all dug into their pockets and had a whip round. Between them they raised £95. [\$190 USD] Using an officially franked Post Office envelope, they sent the cash on to the old lady, and for the rest of the day, all the workers felt a warm glow thinking of the nice thing they had done.

Christmas came and went. A few days later, another letter simply addressed to 'God' landed in the Sorting Office. Many of the postmen gathered around while George opened the letter. It read,

Dear God.

How can I ever thank you enough for what you did for me? Because of your generosity, I was able to provide a lovely luncheon for my friends. We had a very nice day, and I told my friends of your wonderful gift - in fact we haven't gotten over it and even Father John, our parish priest, is beside himself with joy. By the way, there was £5 [\$10 USD] missing. I think it must have been those thieving fellows at the Post Office.

George could not help musing on Oscar Wilde's quote: 'A good deed never goes unpunished.'
