




- † Serving at the church
- † Preoccupied with raising money
- † Doing church work
- † Retiring from church work
- † Surveying internal needs
- † Eager to know everyone
- † Loyal to one another
- † Building faith on information
- † Perpetuating a heritage

Members of Thriving Congregations are:

- † Committed to Christ
- † Deploying Missions
- † Doing hands-on ministry
- † Making disciples
- † On a lifelong quest for quality
- † Serving in the world
- † Preoccupied with rescuing people
- † Finding personal fulfillment
- † Pursuing constant personal growth
- † Sensitizing themselves to community needs
- † Eager for everyone to know God
- † Drawn to the unchurched
- † Building faith on experience with Christ
- † Visioning a future

Their conclusion? "Declining churches want to do everything on the right hand side, without letting go of anything on the left hand side. Thriving churches want wholeheartedly to do everything on the right hand side and are prepared to let go of everything on the left hand side."
